We have arrived again at that time of year of graduations and flying termite! How quickly time flies (no pun intended!). Last year at this time, we were wrapping up our capital campaign appeal. Now, one year later, we are an active construction zone! The sanctuary is receiving much needed repairs and improvements—concrete repairs, painting, improved A/C cooling system, new carpeting, a functional sound system, a new altar window, and more. In the Parish Hall, an ADA accessible bathroom is taking shape along with two additional toilet rooms. All three toilet rooms will be connected by a hallway accessed through an exterior door from the lanai (Ewa, mauka side). The work is on schedule for our return to the sanctuary the first week in August.

In the meantime, we are holding our Sunday services and Thursday Jazz Vespers services in the Parish Hall. It's working! All of you, give yourselves a pat on the back—and then your neighbor's!—because it has been wonderful how everyone has been pitching in to be accommodating, making things quite comfortable and friendly. Fr. Frank Chun reminded me that some of you have been through this before back in 1980 when the church was closed—for a year! We are fortunate because our exodus from the sanctuary is only for the summer. We can and are managing to do this well. I especially want to acknowledge our Executive Committee—Senior Warden Velma Lee, Junior Warden Tim Yuen, Treasurer Nancy Rowe, and Clerk Stephanie Wight. They, along with assistance from the rest of the vestry, have worked extra hard to make this transition as comfortable and smooth as possible. Please give each of them at least two or more pats on the back!

And lastly, and certainly importantly, a huge Mahalo to all of you who have and are steadily contributing to our capital campaign over these three years, thus making all this possible. Since construction must be paid as we go, St. Peter's is in the process of entering into a five year loan for \$350,000. It will be paid down as our pledged amounts come in. I'm guessing we can do this in less than five years. The challenge is on!



Although your leadership is still all deep into the day-to-day work that this renovation period requires, your vestry is already looking ahead to the future and the ministry that is before us. Our mission statement is "A Beacon of Hope, A Call To Serve." While we must take care of our physical plant, that is

not our reason for being. We exist as a congregation and as Christians to be disciples of Jesus in this world, offering hope to a hurting world and serving those who are the most challenged amongst us. That is the legacy that has been handed down to us by the generations who have preceded us at St. Peter's. It was their love of God, their commitment to the way of Jesus, and their willingness to be led by the Holy Spirit in new and varied ways that brought us to where we are today. That same Spirit is still guiding us today. Come, Holy Spirit, our souls inspire!

## Meet our Stained Glass Artisans! Jim Erickson and Annalee Jones

St. Peter's simply has THE BEST stained glass artisan team on the island! For the past 40 years, Jim Erickson has specialized in church window design and restoration with a studio on the North Shore. His knowledge and experience in the field are vast. He is St. Peter's stained glass consultant and the one who worked with us in designing the new and improved window. A colored pencil rendition of it currently resides in the church office.

Annalee Jones is the fabricator of the new window. Her studio, Glass Rainbows, is on the windward side. Annalee has an art background and entered the world of stained glass in 1995. She quickly became known for her meticulously crafted, beautiful work. Both Jim and Annalee consider the way their partnership for this project evolved to be, well, divinely guided! (Are we surprised? I think not! dm)



The old altar window that is deteriorating will be "taped" to keep it together as well as possible for removal and then carefully lowered in sections beginning June 6th. The pieces will be crated and saved for future cleaning (lead residue needs to be cleaned off) and then designed into mementos or

perhaps used in other places in the Aloha Room and/or Parish Hall.

The replacement of this altar window is an emergency project, the need for which was discovered after the construction contract went out to bid. We are very, very blessed: the original altar window was a gift from the Kong family in memory of Rev. Kong's father; the descendants of Rev. Kong, as well as the Kau and Liu families, are gifting St. Peter's with the new window in gratitude for their faithful family members who loved and were dedicated to this church. What a beautiful tribute, and huge gratitude from us!

## Be Safe on the Square!

On Tuesday, May 23rd, Officer Steve Matsuda (pictured far right), our Neighborhood Police



Officer, along with his team, L-R Officer Edmund Ho, Officer Robert Sterling, and Officer Alan Ibra were at St. Peter's Episcopal Church. They offered a Power Point presentation to eight staff and parishioners on St. Andrew's Square. The presentation covered deterring crime, suspect identification, and pedestrian safety.

Officer Matsuda explained that most theft is a result of "Crimes of Opportunity." He explained that those who want to commit a crime are carefully watching for an opportunity and are ready to act fast. Officer Sterling introduced the "Crime Triangle," a combination of desire, ability, and opportunity coming together. A common mistake, he said, is leaving valuables, e.g. a purse, laptop, cell phone, in plain view in a car. It takes no time at all to break a window and grab the valuables. Lessen the opportunity and the likelihood of crime drops.

Officer Ho gave a tutorial on suspect identification. Pay attention to things like hair length and color, glasses or not, the color and style of clothing including footwear and/or hat, complexion, whether something is in a hand (weapon?), and other identifying characteristics such as tattoos, scars, speech impediment, accent, or limp. If someone gets away, look outside and see if you can identify a vehicle or a license plate number.

Officer Ibra spoke about pedestrian safety. HPD is working hard to lower pedestrian fatalities. He stressed making eye contact with drivers to be sure they see you and not making the assumption that because you are in a crosswalk that they see you. Better to be safe, he said, than small kine "mah-ke." Mahalo to our community officers who are attentively watching and keeping us safe!

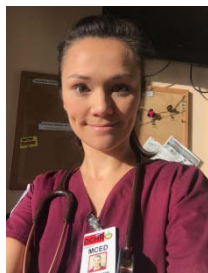

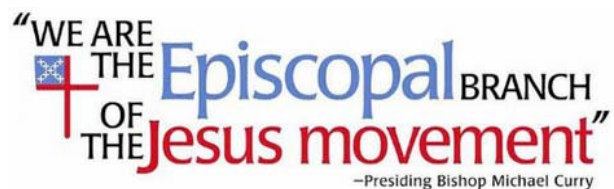

## Central Middle School

For the past few years, administrators and folks from the Nu'uuanu YMCA, Harris United Methodist, and St. Peter's Episcopal have partnered with Central Middle School (CMS) to support the school's staff and students. Last year a new program called the Power Scholars Academy was brought to CMS by the Nu'uuanu YMCA, a nationwide program of the YMCA that combines academic courses taught by licensed teachers in reading and math as well as enrichment classes, and physical fitness. Harris and St. Peter's assisted in providing hot meals.

Although last year's enrollment in the program was less than capacity (24 out of 60), it was so well received that this year there are already 50 rising 6th and 7th graders signed up with capacity at 96! The Power Scholars Academy, whose theme *Camp's Got Talent*, will run from June 5th-July 14th. The goal is to find and highlight each scholar's talents. Enrichment includes Aikido, Break Dancing, Street Hip Hop, Street Art, Basketball, STEM, Sports, Swimming, and Digital Media.

The YMCA received a grant to cover breakfast and lunch for each scholar throughout the duration of the Academy. Valuing our partnership, they have asked us to help provide healthy snacks and as well as volunteers to serve lunch (generally 12noon-12:30pm at CMS). CMS administrators have requested snacks such as crackers with spreadable cheese, frozen ice pops, sun chips, Oreos, pretzels with spreadable cheese, chips, and animal crackers. Snacks can be dropped off on Sundays or in the church office during the week. If you can serve lunch once, twice, or more this summer, please speak with Pastor Diane or call the church office, 533-1943.

## Curry Leaves

Did you know there's a curry leaf tree in St. Peter's garden? *Murraya koenigii* is a tropical to sub-tropical tree in the family [Rutaceae](#), and is native to India and Sri Lanka. Its leaves, generally called by the name 'curry leaves,' are used in many South Asian dishes. (Wikipedia) The glossy green leaves are very aromatic, and they have a unique flavor all their own. There is a citrus element, along with something else that's hard to put your finger on -- some say asafoetida, and others anise. In her book *Classic Indian Cooking*, Julie Sahni describes the leaves as having "a bitterish taste and a sweetish, pungent aroma almost like lemon grass." (Food 52)

Besides offering an interesting flavor to your curries, curry leaves may be good for your health. According to Ayurvedic medicine, curry leaves are believed to have medicinal properties, such as anti-diabetic, antioxidant, antimicrobial, anti-inflammatory, anti-carcinogenic and hepato-protective (capability to protect liver from damage). (Organic Facts, Top 11 Benefits of Curry Leaves)

Curry leaves taste best fresh, and will keep in the refrigerator for a few days. They can be dried or frozen, though not without some loss of flavor.

Help yourself to some curry leaves, and try one of the recipes posted on the Parish Hall bulletin board.
